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From the Chapter Continuing Education Committee: “Quality Filtering: Principles of Evidence-Based Medicine”

The Continuing Education Committee of the Philadelphia Regional Chapter of MLA hosted “Quality Filtering: Principles of Evidence-Based Medicine” on Thursday, October 6th at A.I. duPont Hospital for Children in Wilmington, Delaware. This well-attended workshop was taught by three colleagues, Rebecca Jerome, Sandi Martin and Pauline Todd, from the Annette and Irwin Eskin Biomedical Library at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, Tennessee. This was the largest class that the instructors had ever taught. Thirty-eight people registered, with some participants coming from as far away as Virginia, Maryland and New Jersey.

Concepts in evidence-based medicine were covered, including detailed descriptions of clinical research studies, using the PICO method to ask well-built questions, and how to develop one’s own medical knowledge base. The instructors also highlighted the next level of providing evidence-based information to clinicians by discussing how to select and summarize appropriate articles.

This hands-on workshop became very lively when M&Ms® were used in a demonstration of the varying study designs and potential flaws. Many M&M® participants “dropped out” of populations and into attendees’ mouths well before the clinical trials were finished, making follow-up a nightmare! §

What do you find most interesting about your work? I like working with the students and seeing their progress over the time they are here.

What qualities or traits do you find most helpful in your work? The traits I find most helpful are attention to detail, a sense of humor, and perseverance

Profile #2: Joan McKenzie

Present Professional Position: Coordinator for Technical Services, College of Physicians of Philadelphia

Past Professional Experience: I began at the College in 1970 as Head of the Regional Photocopy Services Department, and have been here ever since. When I received my Library Science degree from Drexel in 1973, I moved into the position of Cataloger, and remained there for many years. In 1994, I became head of the Technical Services Department. I am still the primary cataloger, and, coming full circle, I am also responsible for interlibrary loan borrowing.

What do you find most interesting about your work? I love cataloging. Recently, I have been particularly fascinated by some of the items in the Robert L. Sadoff Library of Forensic Psychiatry and Legal Medicine. There are reports of trials from the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries citing the insanity defense, many of which are not represented in OCLC. It is a pleasure to add these titles to our holdings, and to make them available to other libraries. I am also enjoying using Docline and OCLC's Resource Sharing to obtain books and journal articles that the College of Physicians of Philadelphia does not own. Referrals are certainly much easier than they were 35 years ago. I remember searching through several typed or printed holdings lists in order to locate an obscure journal.

What qualities or traits do you find most helpful in your work? Attention to detail and willingness to hunt for information are important. Familiarity with computers and the Internet help a lot. We can do so much more than we could years ago. I was recently asked how we cataloged before OCLC -- and I had to stop and think about it.

What do you enjoy doing "for fun"? I read a LOT of novels - mystery, science fiction, romance, etc. When I can tear myself away from the books, I like to do different kinds of needlework. I recently completed a quilt for my new grandniece. I used to sing in my church choir before it was disbanded due to insufficient membership, but I still enjoying singing with a larger group that puts on two concerts a year.

Is there anything about you that others might be surprised to know? No, I don't think I'm a very surprising person. Most people probably would NOT be surprised to know that my four cats rule the household. Unfortunately, they refuse to do any of the work.

Why would you encourage members to become actively involved in the Philadelphia Regional Chapter? It's a wonderful way to get to know people, and to learn what's happening in other libraries and in the Chapter. I have met many wonderful people since becoming Archives Chair in 1994. I wish I had joined the Chapter and become involved thirty-some years ago, but at that time it seems that meetings were always held on Thursday evenings, which was a bad time for me. We now try to hold meetings, programs and CE courses at a variety of times and locations. One of the best ways to ensure that the "what, when and where" of the Chapter's activities meet your needs is to join in the planning.

TechnoHumanist Corner

If Obi-Wan Kenobi were a librarian, speaking to his young Padawan (librarian in training), Luke Skywalker, he would probably say, “Luke, I sense a great disturbance in the Force.” That great disturbance in the Force (cyberspace) comes from bookmarks. Before the Web, we felt information overload from printed matter. Now that the Web is an integral part of our information world, we bookmark where we find our information. The number of bookmarks we have created has increased to the point that some of us are on the verge of drowning in them.

Has this happened to you? You are at home working on a web presentation for work when you realize that the web addresses of those 10-15 great sites you were going to review are bookmarked on your office computer. Since the web addresses are not on your home computer, with great frustration you Google the sites all over again. Or, a colleague asks you to suggest two or three good medical statistics sites and you say, “Sure, give me a minute.” You look at your bookmark list, which could probably stretch from here to Kansas, and 15 minutes later, you’re still looking for those sites. Or better yet, you’re organized; you’re on top of things. Your bookmarks are in neatly labeled folders. The folders have folders within folders within folders, etc. Your bookmarks have become an electronic version of the Russian Babushka Dolls. No matter how organized we are, we still have problems keeping track of and finding the bookmarks we readily need.

If you identify with or have experienced any of these situations, then let me say two words that will alleviate some of these problems – Social Bookmarking.

Social Bookmarking or Tagging, as it is sometimes called, helps re-direct us to some of the original goals of the World Wide Web. One of those goals was collaboration between individuals regardless of their geographical location. Things would be posted and people could comment on them. You could serendipitously find a valuable piece of information. The exchange of information and ideas in turn fosters a sense of community. That was the social aspect of the Web. Bookmarks locate information, which is important to an individual. The importance of the information may be the result of your personal or professional interests. Social Bookmarking allows us to share our bookmarks with others who do not have access to the browsers on our computers.

How does Social Bookmarking work? The first thing to do is subscribe to an online bookmarking service such as Del.icio.us, Yahoo’s My Web, or Nature Publishing Group’s Connotea. Since Social Bookmarking is a fairly new movement and entrepreneurs are seeking to generate more interest, many online services, such as the ones just mentioned, are free. Social Bookmarking requires that you have access to a server. Your bookmarks will reside on a server rather than on your computer. When you save your bookmarks to the server, you “tag” the bookmarks with keywords you have created. For example, you can tag a site that has good LOS hospital statistics for the Philadelphia area as *Hospital—Stats—LOS—Phila. Area*. This is preferable to opening your browser’s list of bookmarks and looking into the Statistics folder, which has a sub-

folder, Hospitals, then clicking on the bookmarks in the sub-folder until you find the site with the Philadelphia-area LOS statistics.

One of the benefits of having your bookmarks reside in one central place is that they can be accessed from anywhere in the world via computer. Also, if you get a new computer or your computer suddenly dies, those valuable bookmarks will not disappear or have to be transferred to a new computer. They are safe from harm. Having the bookmarks on the server does not prevent you from also listing them in your browser.

Another benefit is that in addition to the URL, many services will allow you to save a copy or partial copy of the web page. This is a good thing. As we all know, on the Web, pages move, are taken down or changed. If any of these situations should occur, you still have a copy of the page with the information you needed.

A third advantage of Social Bookmarking is that you can discover new resources you did not know existed. Since bookmarks lists are posted on a server, members of your service can do a keyword search to retrieve other bookmarks on a topic of their interest. Once a retrieval set is accessed, bookmarks can be viewed and copied. Keywords can also be changed. The original bookmark cannot be altered because it belongs to another member. You can only make changes to items in your account. For instance, if you search the online service's bookmarks for the keyword *evidence-based medicine* and find a bookmark tagged *evidence-based medicine – teaching*, you can copy the bookmark and change its keywords to *ebm—tutorial* because it's really a tutorial rather than *ebm teaching* resources.

Social Bookmarking promotes collaboration and a sense of community. Since people are searching specific keywords, they probably share the same topical interests. This can create communities of users around a specific topic. Also, by being able to view other people's bookmarks, you can develop a new awareness of how others see a topic.

You may be saying to yourself, "I see the advantages of Social Bookmarking, but what are its limitations?" One limitation is its age. This is a very young movement-- less than four years old. Therefore, its tools are constantly evolving. In other words, tools will be upgraded to make them more flexible and user-friendly. Also, new bookmarking services will come and go, so you need to choose wisely. Second, a bookmarking service is only as good as its members. For instance, if your service community consists of mostly programmers, you may not get see too many medically-related bookmarks to explore. In this case, I would consider finding another service. Another problem might be the tagging. There is no standardization on tag terms to use. This means that when it comes to searching the bookmarks in their service, people who require uniformity of terms may find searching a frustrating experience. Remember, one of the goals of this movement is to tailor the organization of your bookmarks to meet your needs. Finally, there is the universal web problem of spam. Tags will be spammed. Fortunately, it's such a big problem on the Web that as soon as an organization gets spammed, it quickly musters its resources to fight it. The bookmarking services will do the same thing.

In my opinion, Social Bookmarking is an idea whose time has come. Its application will alter the information landscape and the manner in which we organize web information. Try this new phenomenon. To learn more about Social Bookmarking, visit these sites:
